
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INTRODUCTION

WITH A POPULATION OF 66,000, UCF IS AN INSTITUTION TO BE RECOGNIZED.

- PRESIDENT HITT'S FOURTH GOAL "TO BECOME MORE INCLUSIVE AND DIVERSE"
- THE UNIVERSITY'S ETHNIC MINORITY ENROLLMENT STANDS AT 45.4%
- AS OF SPRING 2017, UCF RECOGNIZED AS AN EMERGING HISPANIC SERVING INSTITUTION (HSI).
- NATIVE AMERICAN STUDENTS ONLY MAKE UP .2% OF THE STUDENT POPULATION

ABSTRACT

AMONG ALL STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS, NATIVE AMERICAN STUDENTS REMAIN THE LOWEST IN ENROLLMENT NUMBERS. WITH NO TRIBAL COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES (TBCU)S IN THE STATE OF FLORIDA, UCF CAN TAKE NECESSARY STEPS TO INCREASE ENROLLMENT OF NATIVE AMERICAN STUDENTS; SPECIFICALLY STUDENTS WHO IDENTITY AS SEMINOLE OR MICCOSUKEE INDIAN. THE CONTENT OF THIS RESEARCH PROJECT WILL FURTHER EXPLORE HISTORICAL INFLUENCES AND PERCEPTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION, AND ITS INFLUENCE ON LOW ENROLLMENT AND LOW RETENTION NUMBERS, ENROLLMENT DATA, STATISTICS AND STUDENT PROGRAMMING IMPLEMENTED FOR RETENTION PURPOSES. DUE TO THE CONTENT OF THIS TOPIC, THE FOLLOWING TERMS WILL BE USED INTERCHANGEABLY: NATIVE AMERICAN, AMERICAN INDIAN AND ALASKA NATIVE, STUDENT DEMOGRAPHIC, STUDENT POPULATION.

KEY RESEARCH FINDINGS

- ACCORDING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND NATIONAL CENTER FOR EDUCATION STATISTICS, IN 2006 AMERICAN INDIAN/ALASKA NATIVE STUDENTS ACCOUNTED FOR 1% OF TOTAL ENROLLMENT IN COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES.
- 39% OF NATIVE STUDENTS WHO ENROLLED IN A FOUR YEAR INSTITUTION IN THE FALL OF 2004 COMPLETED A BACHELORS DEGREE BY 2010 COMPARED TO 62% OF WHITE STUDENTS (NATIVE YOUTH REPORT P 19, 2014).
- CULTURALLY TRADITIONAL AMERICAN INDIAN STUDENTS CAN EITHER EXPERIENCE RESISTANCE OR TRANSCULTURATION ADJUSTING TO CAMPUS LIFE IMPACTING RETENTION AND PERSISTENCE (HUFFMAN, 2011).
- PROCESS OF ESTRANGEMENT IS A SERIES OF STAGES EXPLAINING ACTS OF RESISTANCE AND THE PERCEPTION OF THE INSTITUTION ITSELF IN ASSIMILATION.
 - INITIAL ALIENATION*
 - DISILLUSIONMENT
 - EMOTIONAL REJECTION
 - DISENGAGEMENT*
